Lending Grant

In the Spring of last year Covington's Technology Coordinator, Sonya Lanham, applied for the Lending Grant. CISD was awarded the 2018-2019 Technology Lending Grant. The purpose of the grant is to provide local educational agencies the funds to purchase technology devices that are loaned to students for access to digital instructional material off campus, who would not otherwise have access. The grant is \$50,000 and is being used to purchase new Chromebooks for our students in fourth, fifth, sixth, and ninth grades. Along with these devices, hotspots were also purchased. These hotspots will be available for students in these grades to check out of the library as needed. The Kajeet hotspots will have the same filters as our school filters and we will be able to monitor where students go on the Internet. Students may also be limited on the websites that they can access. If any additional information is needed, please contact Mrs. Sonya Lanham.

Elementary Student Council

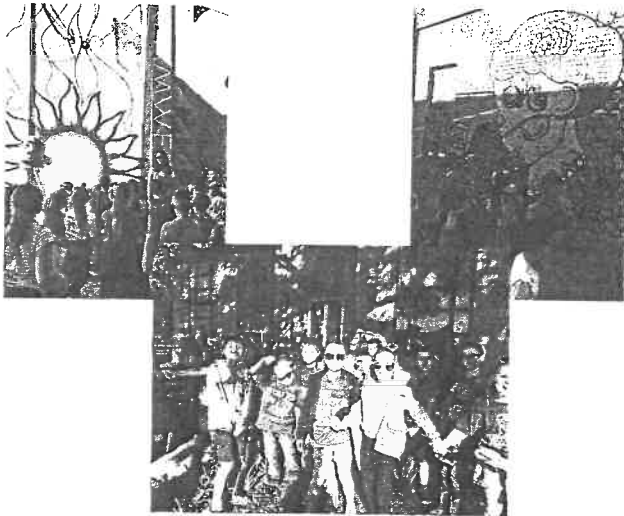

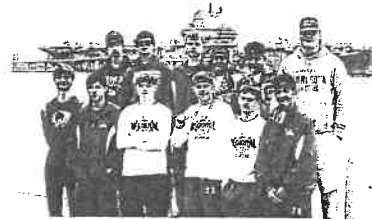
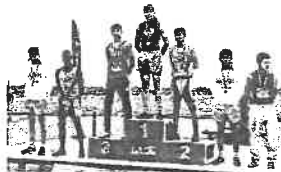
Sports Highlights

2018 Region IV Championships

Covington Cross Country finished 5th overall at the 2018 Region IV Championships on Monday, October 22nd down in Corpus Christi. Only the top 4 teams advance to the State Meet. Senior, Klay Howard, last year's Region 3 Champion, claimed another Regional Crown. Clocked at 15:17.64, Klay dominated the Region IV course on the Texas A&M Corpus Christi Islanders Campus. Corpus Christi, like the entire State, had to deal with running a Championship Meet after so much rain and did a good job with the course and hosting the Championships despite the days of so much rain. Senior, Gerardo Cipres had a good race as well, recovering from having tweaked his ankle the week of the District Meet. He finished 4th overall. New comer, Junior, Makiah Cserfoi has come such a long way, since the start of the season, qualifying for his 1st State Meet after a great top 10 finish. He was 10th overall. Senior, Austin Windham finished 63 and Freshman, Hayden Burt was 139 to round out Covington's top 5.

On the girls side, Junior, Valerie Cipres finished 8th with a time of 12:38.32. After narrowly missing out on the State Meet experience last season, she left no doubt that she would be on the bus making the trip down to Round Rock this year.

Coach Rodriguez states, "I am extremely proud of every one of our runners who made the long trip to Corpus. As well, I am so proud of every Covington Runnin' Owl, from our Junior High, all the way up to our Varsity team members. There is still a lot of work to get done as we will continue to strive to advance as a team to the State Meet."

Coronation is a long tradition at CISD, no one knows the origins of our annual Coronation/Carnival. Originally it was held in the fall after the farmers got their crops in and had a little extra money. Through the years, monies raised have been used to purchase many items for our students such as scholarships, playground equipment, athletic uniforms, digital sign in front of school, and classroom items.

Coronation will be held on December 15, 2018. The festivities will begin at 4:00 pm. Please be supportive of our nominated Dukes and Duchesses from each grade level as they are raising money out and about our community. This years' nominees are as follows.

On the afternoon of the Coronation, four Queens and Kings are crowned. There is a Queen and King crowned from the elementary (Pre-K through 2nd grade), the intermediate (3rd through 5th grade), junior high school (6th through 8th grade) and the high school (9th through 12th). The Queens and Kings are determined by the amount of money each couple collects. All of the money collected goes to the school and is used for scholarships, the educational field trip to Austin for the 7th grade Texas History class, and any other unfunded projects for all students. The money is to be turned in at the administration office by 2:30 p.m. the day of Coronation and is to be counted by the Business manager, Superintendent, and school board members.

Kindergarten students serve as attendants to the Queens and Kings. It is a formal occasion. Therefore, the Dukes and boy attendants wear suits and the Duchesses and girl attendants wear formal dresses. When the Queens and Kings are crowned, they are robed with a long satin train trimmed in silver. The Queens receive a tiara and the Kings a scepter that they may keep as a memento of their reign. The robes, tiaras, scepters, and satin and laced pillows that are used by the attendants to carry the tiaras will be provided by the school.

Reading BINGO

Elementary students are being encouraged to participate in "Reading Bingo." Each AR folder has a Bingo card in it. The rules to the game are as follows.

1. Must read a suggestion from each square on the Bingo card.
2. Must pass AR Quiz with a 70 or higher.
3. All books must have a different title.
4. All books read must be on your AR level.
5. Must write the title of book and score achieved on back of the card.
6. Must have a parent, teacher, or librarian sign each item finished.

The game involves reading books from different Dewey numbers. For example, reading a book from the 700s or a book about a holiday.

Once the student gets a Bingo, they bring their folder to the librarian for verification that they have completed the Bingo. They will receive a prize from the prize box. If the student completes the whole Bingo card before the end of the year, they will get a FREE ice cream or slushy card to spend at the cafeteria.

Accelerated Reading Goals

ALL students will read books meeting their AR reading level unless otherwise changed by the teacher.

Kindergarten will check out at least one fiction and/or nonfiction book on the LG interest level.

First through third graders are to read Lower Grade (LG) interest level books. These books are more appropriate in vocabulary and context.

Students in K-3 will not be permitted to read Middle Grade (MG) interest level books even if they are on their level unless approved by teacher.

Grades 4 - 5 will read books on their assigned reading level with the LG and/or MG interest level AR. Remember each student should be checking-out at least one chapter book.

After they have reached their AR Goal, students in grades fourth and fifth may check out books at their reading level and above on the LG and/or MG category.

Grade 6 will read books on their assigned reading level with the MG interest level. They may choose books from the high school area with the MG level with approval from teacher.

After sixth grade students have reached their AR Goal, students may check out books at their reading level and above on the MG interest level.

BoxTops for Education,

All classes are encouraged to donate their BoxTops to the school library. Collecting is really easy, just cut BoxTops from participating products, put them in a baggie, and drop off at the library. Be sure to put the grade level of your donations. Each six weeks any class, PK - 12, turning in the most BoxTops will get a 15-minute Popcorn Break in the library.
